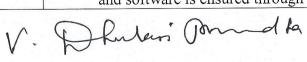

Major Research Projects need to be promoted.
2.3.2 .Resource Mobilization for Research:	 Research facilities upgraded through UGC research grants, DST-FIST programme, State Council for Science Technology and Environment, Kerala University and ASPIRE scholarship for student research PTA funds for Registration of Research Centres. Seed money/funding from college for research is yet to be initiated.
2.3.3 Research Facilities:	 Library, Computer lab, language lab equipments available for research. Instrumentation centre, IT Mission with Five networking Laboratories are available for research work.
